These examples are not all inclusive. They are just to show how many of your everyday activities fit within the framework of an active Catholic life. For more examples, see the USCCB websites under each section.

Spiritual Works of Mercy

- Instruct the ignorant
 - help others with schoolwork, help teach RE, bring a friend to Mass,
- Counsel the doubtful
 - be a friend to a despairing student, strengthen one whose faith in God's truth is wavering
- Admonish sinners
 - don't give in to peer pressure, going to Confession, encourage others to go to Confession
- Bear wrongs patiently
 - do not strike back physically, verbally, or interiorly; don't hold a grudge;
- Forgive offenses willingly
 - pray for those who insult/persecute you, let others know you forgive them
- Comfort the afflicted/sorrowful
 - support to someone who just failed at something (a test, getting on a sports team, etc.)
- Pray for the living and the dead
 - Attend funerals, pray at cemeteries, for living & dead in your daily prayers

Corporal Works of Mercy

- Feed the hungry:
 - help with a food drive or at a food bank, take food to the homebound
- Give drink to the thirsty
 - take water to someone doing hard work outside
- Clothe the naked
 - give away some clothes to charity, knit/sew for local homeless shelter/pregnancy center
- Harbor the harborless
 - support (time, alms) a homeless or domestic violence shelter
- Visit the sick
 - chat with or write to the homebound or those confined to a hospital or senior center
- Ransom the captive
